

The Brunn Castle Radio Museum

Some 200 years ago, distinguished hunting parties peopled Brunn Castle, whereas it is now home to a time-watch of radio history.

The castle was built in 1753. The Franconian line (of Pückler and Limburg) of the old Silesian noble family of Pückler von Grodlitz established it as a summer and hunting castle.

The first floor of the castle intimately portrays the history of German radio. From the people's wireless set to the studio TV camera this unique museum shows everything that's worth hearing and seeing around the development of radio and television. The technology and design of the facilities are at the centre of the exhibition. Also of interest is the documentation of radio as a propaganda tool.

From May 1995, a "Path of Forms" is matched by a demonstration line with audible sound documents that can be played at the touch of a button.

Around 350 equipment exhibits can be seen on a display area of 250 square metres.

The opening times: May to October on Sundays and holidays from 14.00 to 17.00. For groups of 10 persons or more, a visit is possible at all times all the year round.
